



Directory of Population-Focused Funds

Description: The Millions Give Back (MGB) Campaign will propel the leadership and giving power of Black women, highlight the value of Black philanthropy, and mobilize millions from the Black community for social change grantmaking that benefits Black women and their communities.

Background: The Black Women Donors' Action Group (BWDAG) was formed in 2009 to challenge the paradigm presented by the classic philanthropic model centered on the giving of a small number of high net worth individuals. BWDAG's early convenings brought together more than 30 Black women leaders—representing women's funds, foundations, and individual philanthropists—who are committed to democratizing giving through a new strategy for community engagement. From these convenings and other conversations with steering committee leaders, a decision was made to brand this initiative as Millions Give Back (MGB), a campaign designed to expose the positive value and impact of Black giving, redefine engagement with other donor communities, and ensure Black women in philanthropy claim their space in the field. In partnership with the Women's Funding Network, and the Global Fund for Women, the MGB steering committee seeks to create and launch a successful multi-dimensional fundraising campaign.
